Marcia Tjapkes wife of Doug, mother of Matt



Marcia died April 16, 2022, following a lengthy illness. She was 84. Marcia and Doug had been married nearly 65 years. In addition to Doug, she is survived by four adult children (Matt is the youngest) and nine grandchildren.

Marcia was a registered nurse. In addition to her role as a loving wife and mother, she worked professionally as an OR/RN nurse, a hospice nurse, and a parish nurse. A gifted singer, she was a member of the choir at Ferrysburg Community Church for many years. She also served as Sunday School Superintendent, and the church's first woman elder.

But the simple, short personal messages, regardless of the medium chosen to make the expression, were priceless! From all of us to all of you who made the special effort to convey a kind word of comfort: THANK YOU! It meant a lot!

On May 9, 2022, Calvin Prison Initiative students participated in an extraordinary commencement ceremony at the Richard J. Handlon Correctional Facility. There had been no ceremonies for the past 2 years, due to COVID, so this year a gala event was held to honor the graduating classes of 2020, 2021, and 2022. 46 students were awarded bachelor's degrees and 32 were awarded associate's degrees. Some 300 family members were allowed to attend, and HFP Board Member, Dr. John Rottman, was the main speaker. According to MDOC Director Heidi Washington, the event was the largest of its kind ever to take place in a Michigan correctional facility.


